Eucalyptus stellulata Black Sallee. Best known as a subalpine species usually found above 800 metres.



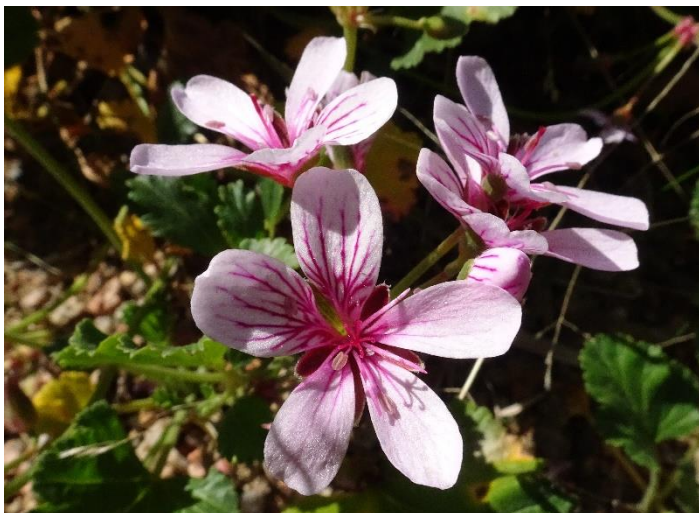
Wahlenbergia stricta Tall Bluebell. A perennial herb that usually flowers in spring and summer.



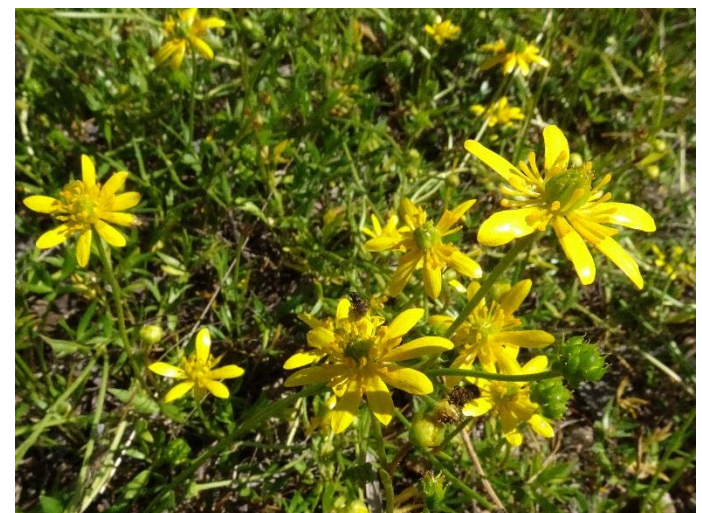
Gynmopilus junonius . Spectacular Rustgill. Growing at the base of a *Eucalyptus nortonii* as it did a year ago.



Arthropodium fimbriatum Chocolate Lily. Known for the chocolate fragrance of their flowers.



Pelargonium sp. *Striatellum*. Omeo Storksbill. A yet to be formally described endangered species.



Ranunculus papulentus Large River Buttercup. Spreads by underground stolons and appreciates moisture.



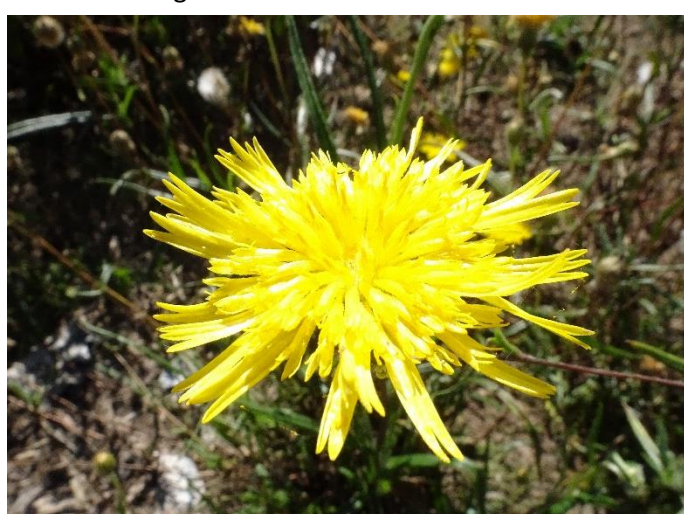
Grevillea lanigera Woolly Grevillea. Named for its woolly branchlets and leaves.



Lotus australis Austral Trefoil. This perennial herb has been flowering for two months.



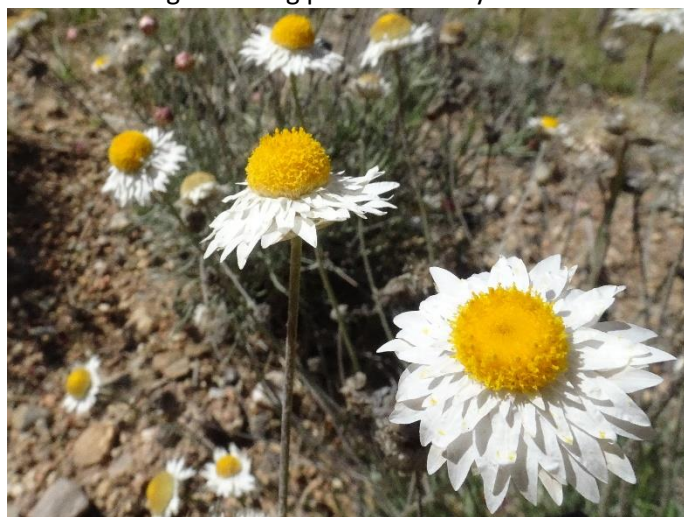
Brachyscome spathulata Spoon-leaved Daisy. A stoloniferous perennial herb of tablelands and slopes.



Podolepis jaceoides Showy Copper-wire Daisy. An attractive long flowering perennial daisy.



Neosparassus sp (genus) Unidentified Badge Huntsman Spider. Unusual colour for this spider.



Leucochrysum albicans Hoary sunray. An attractive everlasting daisy that requires good drainage.
